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Summary of AACS National Legislator's Conference in Washington, D.C.

September 12, 2013

I arrived home last night from Washington, D.C. and the AACS Legislative Conference held there. Thank you for the privilege of being able to go each year to this conference. What a blessing to be able to lobby our Congressmen and find out what is really going on in our nation's Capitol.

There are four issues that we lobbied and distributed letters regarding:

Early Education – It is on our President's agenda to offer free preschool for four- year olds by the end of his second term. Furthermore, the government's plans to 1). reduce the autonomy of all schools to select their own curriculum, 2). require state or federal licensure for preschool teachers, and 3). implement national kindergarten testing, are all things that we lobbied against at the offices of our MN delegation.

ESEA Reauthorization - Historically, seven

reauthorizations have taken place as the bill has been known by different names. The most recent being President Bush's "No Child Left Behind." The problem with another reauthorization is that discussions, so far, have not included any exemptions for private schools. We lobbied for those exemptions. I had appointments with legislative aides in charge of education at the office of Representatives Paulsen, Ellison and Walz. There is a definite difference in the viewpoints of our Democratic Representatives on the four issues mentioned here. In Representatives Ellison and Walz's offices, I was heard, but strongly disagreed with. A seed was planted in both places as discussions are beginning to take place about ESEA in both houses of Congress. H.R. 5 and S.1094 have been written and introduced in both houses of Congress to add private school exemptions. Democratic Representatives and Senators are fighting the exemptions. Representatives Bachmann, Paulsen and Kline were already on board with us and support the exemption language. Legislative aides from Representatives McCollom and Peterson's offices were unavailable to meet with me.

The **HHS Mandate** is being fought in the courts. In Obamacare, the HHS Mandate does not allow for individuals to "retain the

right to provide, purchase, or enroll in health coverage that is consistent with their religious beliefs and moral convictions." There are some 37 cases that are pending on some aspect of this mandate. The good news is that the Supreme Court will most likely hear this case soon. Liberty Counsel, The University of Notre Dame, and Hobby Lobby are three of the 37 organizations that have brought cases through the courts on this issue. The Democratic Representatives are confident that all efforts to challenge the mandate will fail. Aides from Representatives Walz and Ellison were quick to point that out to me. Should this mandate go through, we will lose a huge chunk of our religious freedom. Christians will not be able to live out their faith in the public arena on matters of conscience. Where will this lead? Perhaps we will only be able to practice our faith in the confines of our church walls, but will we be able to share our faith and our convictions in our everyday life in secular society?

Rearing its ugly head again, but not gaining a lot of momentum is the **United Nations Rights of the Child**. It is the Administration's desire to follow the mandate of the United Nations regarding the upbringing of our children. In response to this, many conservative leaders in Congress have brought up the <u>Parental Rights Amendment</u> again. It is not clear whether there will be a push on this issue from the Administration this

term, but we are talking about it now with our Congressmen. The American Association of Christian Schools (MACS is the state chapter) communicated that "Parents should be allowed to direct the upbringing of their children and that American legislators, not international tribunals, must make the public policy for all American families and children."

Overall, the battle lines have been drawn between the conservatives and the liberals in Congress. Not much is being accomplished through traditional standards of passing bills, so the Administration is working hard to pass its agenda by means of the courts and grant competitions like the Early Education Grant that our state won two years ago. We continue to fight the ECIP's (or Early Childhood Indicators of Progress) as a result of the grant. In Governor Dayton's Education Bill, which passed at the end of the last session, private schools do not have an exemption regarding the ECIP's that have already been written by the state. Many of these objectives are simply generally accepted expectations of what children should be able to do at the preschool age. But many of the already written ECIP's do not belong. They were written to indoctrinate children about gender issues, tolerance, etc. In discussion with several of our state legislators over this issue, we found out that these indicators, or objectives would be rewritten in the coming months. I met with the person (at the MN Dept. of Education) who was given that responsibility back in late July. She continues to assure me that we will be invited to public meetings that are scheduled to be held in the coming weeks. It is at these public meetings that we are going to need a strong presence and response. We must not allow this agenda to dominate our early education system.

In the same way, the "Safe Schools Act" (a.k.a. Anti-Bullying Legislation) is an effort to accomplish the same objective. A grass roots effort is underway to educate the public about the dangers of this bill. You can research this bill on your own at the following website: <u>www.mnchildprotectionleague.com</u>. This bill will change the face of public education and eventually affect private schools. This act takes power away from districts to control their curriculum and mandates that issues related to gender and tolerance be at the forefront of the educational process. This undermines what many parents are teaching at home as well as what should be taught in our schools.

Currently, private schools have a very weak exemption in place. We are pushing for a full exemption and will communicate with you soon regarding action that will need to be taken.

In our state, there continues to be a real push to implement an agenda which will cause the gay lifestyle to become an accepted, normal part of MN life within a three-year period. This attack is moving ahead with full force against pre-K thru 12 education. It has strong support in our legislature as well as from our governor. We must pray and take action so that we don't lose the battle in the moral education of our children. We can no longer sit idly by and say that this will not affect us in our Christian schools, home schools, and church bubbles. We are in the process of losing this battle, but the fight is not over. We must engage soldiers and get down on our knees and pray and we must become active in the fight. The indoctrination of our children in our government-run schools is on-going and millions of dollars are prepared to be released in this onslaught if the "Safe Schools Act" is passed. Please educate yourself and become involved in the process.

I was able to learn many things on this trip and wish I had about a week to just sit down and write. I continue to learn more about how the new worldview of "Postmodernism" is affecting culture. I also heard a wonderful defense of "marriage" (from a secular viewpoint) from Ryan Anderson (Heritage Foundation) and want to include some of his thoughts in my worldview presentation spoken about in our recent MACS meeting. There is so much to do and so many time constraints.

Thank you for your interest in legislative issues and I will update you as I have news. God bless.

Each member of the Association shall subscribe to the following Statement of Faith:

We believe that the Bible, both the Old and New Testaments, was given by inspiration of God, and is our only rule in matters of faith and practice.

We believe in creation, not evolution: that man was created by the direct act of God and in the image of God. We believe that Adam and Eve, in yielding to the temptation of Satan, became fallen creatures. We believe that all men are born in sin.

We believe in the Incarnation, the Virgin Birth, and the Deity of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We believe in His vicarious and substitutional Atonement for the sins of mankind by the shedding of His blood on the cross. We believe in the resurrection of His body from the tomb, His ascension into Heaven, and that He is now our Advocate. We believe that He is personally coming again.

We believe in His power to save men from sin. We believe in the necessity of the New Birth, and that this New Birth is through the regeneration by the Holy Spirit. We believe that salvation is by grace through faith, plus nothing--minus nothing, in the atoning blood of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

We believe that this statement of faith is a basis for Christian fellowship, and that all born-again men and women who sincerely accept it can and should live together in peace, and that it is their Christian duty to promote harmony among the members of the Body of Christ, who are walking separately from the world both in theory and in practice.

We further believe in the Biblical doctrine of ecclesiastical separation, and therefore believe that churches and Christian schools should not be associated with, members of, or in accord with organizations or movements such as the World Council of Churches, the National Council of Churches, the Modern Charismatic Movement, or the Ecumenical Movement.
