

Studies Show the Importance of Family!

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From the Washington Standard, a periodical published by the Family Research Council, comes a study that determined the 10 best states to live in if you are conservative. The study was based on the 2025 Family Structure Index that ranked all 50 states according to three criteria:

- The percentage of married adults between the ages of 25-54
- The percentage of children, aged 15-17, who live with their married parents
- The average number of lifetime births per woman

What I found fascinating was that the outcomes coincided closely with conservative political ideology in almost all states. Here are the top ten states to live in if you are a conservative:

1. Utah
2. Idaho
3. Nebraska
4. South Dakota
5. Wyoming
6. Kansas (Go Kansans!)
7. North Dakota
8. Iowa
9. Texas
10. Minnesota (probably because you are all so nice!) ☺

Among the 10 lowest states that least support conservative ideology are:

Illinois (41); Oregon (42); California (44); New York (48); and Rhode Island (50).³

Across the board, states with declining birthrates and higher percentages of children in single-parent homes (often referred to as High Family Instability) showed lower high school graduation rates, higher levels of violent crime, lower economic well-being, and higher poverty rates.



Surprisingly Minnesota, considered a purple state, made it to the top ten! The Gopher State matched the average percentage of students nationwide who attend private schools (10%). According to recent PEW research (2025), 63% of Minnesotans identify as Christian, with growing church attendance in non-denominational churches.⁴

Traditionally, amongst American Association of Christian Schools (AACS) nationally, Minnesota's number of member schools and student population ranks right in the middle, despite the fact that there are no state or federal scholarship incentive programs available for our families.

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In addition, Minnesota ranks among the top three states (tied with Colorado) with the lowest poverty rate nationwide (around 9%), while California and Louisiana are tied with the highest (17.7%).²

Minnesota is also known, politically, as a purple state because of its political division. Liberal strongholds are found in its major cities: Minneapolis, St. Paul, and Rochester, but rural areas are predominately conservative. In the 2024 presidential election, Minnesota went to DFL presidential candidate, Harris, by a smaller than expected 4.2% margin (AI overview).



As I evaluate these statistics, I realize that the root of family values comes from God's Word. God's Divine Institutions of marriage and the family help us to understand that when people hold important what God deems as important (from His word), a stronger and better overall quality of life results. And there is proof in the statistics! Our students, in AACCS schools (AACCS is a state chapter within the greater national organization of AACCS), scored an average of 11 percentage points higher on the Grade Equivalent Scores in our annual Iowa Achievement Testing. These scores include all published scores of all private and public schools nationwide that took the April Iowa Test. The individual grades that had the highest



scores above the national average were: Kindergarten (32% higher); 9th grade (17% higher); 10th grade (20% higher); 11th grade (27% higher); and 12th grade (25% higher). Elementary and middle grades ranged anywhere from 5-20 percentage points higher than the national averages.¹

In addition, our churches and schools uphold the highest standards of God's word and continue in their mission to teach and encourage our families and students with high moral and academic standards. It is up to us to share the gospel as others observe our families and notice a difference in us. Your godly family's ministry to the secular world is the example that can draw others to the gospel, to our churches, and to our schools.

Many of the growing statistical trends in our culture help us to understand that God is still working in our nation, and He uses the family as a key biblical institution to accomplish so many of His purposes. Let us continue to strive to promote, teach, and maintain the incredible institution of the family and its example to a world that needs to see what family stability is supposed to look like.
